Conclusion

Ownership of the secondary English curriculum is in the infancy stage. The use of a top down policy approach was problematic in the initial implementation phase. Solutions have to be provided to assist in the long term acceptance and sustainability of the curriculum.

- Collaboration between Education Department, secondary schools and teacher training institutions on professional development programs for English teachers
