# **Sport-for-Development Phenomenon**


- Steady Increase in S4D Organisations and Projects
- Recognition and Support of S4D by Leading Associations and Development Agencies (FIFA, IOC, UNOSDP etc.)
- Caveats: 'Peace Evangelists'; One-Size-Fits-All Attitude
- Challenges in Practice: Funding, S4D Knowledge
- Challenges in Research: The Role of the Change Agent...





### The Case: Sri Lanka

- Ethnically, Religiously and Linguistically Diverse Society
- Ethnic Tensions Between GOSL and LTTE
  - LTTE founded in 1976 to fight for an Independent Tamil State
  - Civil war from 1983 2002
  - 80,000 victims
  - De facto state in northern Sri Lanka
- Clear Separation of Ethnic Communities
- CFA and Peace Process Started in 2002;
  Back to Open Civil War in January 2008
- End of Civil War in May 2009
- Intergroup Relations Deeply Shattered



## **Asian-German Sports Exchange Program**

- \* A.G.S.E.P. as a 'Change Agent' in Sri Lanka since 1989
- Focus on Social Development and Reconciliation since 2002
- Study Based Around Two Participatory Sport Events:
  - International Run for Peace (Oct. 2006, Colombo, "Sports for all")
  - Intercultural Sport Meeting (Jan. 2007, Marawila, "Youth focus")







## The Sport Event Reconciliation Projects

- International Run for Peace (Oct. 2006, Colombo)
  - Large-Scale Sports For All Event
  - Individual Participation 3 Categories
  - Social Focus and Means to Increase Awareness
- Intercultural Sport Meeting (Jan. 2007, Marawila)
  - Small-Scale Youth Development Project
  - Mixed Community Approach
  - Multi-Sport and Culture Program

### **Research Question:**

What is the Role of an International Change Agent in Facilitating Sport Development Projects?

#### Methodology:

- Interpretive Paradigm
- Qualitative Case Study Approach

#### Methods:

- 2 Focus Groups (pre event)
- Observation (during event)
- 35 In-depth Interviews (post event)




